# Follow-Up Discussion: Maryland Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) Federal CARES Act

Ms. Dina Barclay, Director; Ms. Rita Wood, Housing Authority Chief; and Ms. Patricia King, Community Development Administrator, Department of Community Services and Mr. Michael Bellis, Executive Director, United Way of Charles County joined the Commissioners to review the request to approve the Maryland Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) Federal CARES Act for emergency rental assistance program.

A motion was made by Commissioner Bowling, seconded by Commissioner Rucci and passed, with all Commissioners present, voting in favor to approve Resolution 2020-15 for the Charles County's application for the Community Development Block Grant funds.

Mr. Wes Adams, County Attorney, reviewed the June 3, 2020 "Order of the Governor of the State of

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Maryland Number 20-06-03-01 Amending and Restating the Order of May 27, 2020, Allowing Reopening of Certain Businesses and Facilities Subject to Local Regulation.

At 9:56 a.m., a motion was made by Commissioner Rucci, seconded by Commissioner Bowling and passed with all Commissioners present, voting in favor to end Closed Session.

At 10:08 a.m. the Commissioners returned to virtual open session.

# <u>Discussion: Opening Charles County Within Parameters of Governor Hogan's Executive Order to Move into Phase Two of "Maryland Strong: Roadmap to Recovery"</u>

Dr. Howard Haft, Executive Director, Maryland Primary Care Program, Maryland Department of Health; Ms. Michelle Lilly, Director, Department of Emergency Services; and Mr. Thomas Blanford, Chair, Charles County Chamber of Commerce, joined the Commissioners to discuss implementing Governor Hogan's expanded phase two guidelines of "Maryland Strong: Roadmap to Recovery."

Mr. Wes Adams, County Attorney, reviewed Governor Hogan's expanded order for allowing reopening of certain businesses and facilities subject to local regulation and the interpretive guide.

Dr. Haft and Ms. Lilly both indicated that the overall numbers of COVID cases was down and that they will continue to monitor the situation with the gradual reopening of businesses and activities.

Mr. Blanford shared a statement from the Charles County Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the Southern Maryland Minority Chamber of Commerce, and the Business Associations from La Plata, Indian Head and the Western County indicating that businesses were ready to continue to reopen safely and responsibly within the updated framework.

A motion was made by Commissioner Bowling, seconded by Commissioner Rucci and passed, with all Commissioners present, voting in favor to adopt Governor Hogan's June 3rd executive order which further permits new establishments to open subject to certain restrictions as of 5:00 pm on June 5th. pursuant to that order - all restrictions in place, unless otherwise removed, remain in effect under this proposed order. The major changes allow retail establishments to open to fifty percent (50%) capacity, manufacturing business and facilities can open to one hundred percent (100%) staffing, certain personal services - tattoo parlors, tanning salons, massage parlors and nail services can reopen subject to the following: mask requirements for all staff and patrons, on appointment basis, at fifty percent (50%) capacity and with mandatory cleaning and disinfecting in between services.

At 10:35 a.m., a motion was made by Commissioner Rucci, seconded by Commissioner Bowling and passed, with all Commissioners present, voting in favor to adjourn.
