Commissioner Collins called the meeting to order, and Commissioner Bowling led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call

A roll call was taken. All Commissioners were present.

Comments

A motion was made by Commissioner Bowling, seconded by Commissioner Rucci and passed, with all Commissioners present, voting in favor to make today April 13, 2021, a Legislative Day.

Charles County Health Department Update: Coronavirus/COVID-19

Dr. Dianna Abney, Health Officer, Charles County Department of Health; Ms. Michelle Lilly, Director, Department of Emergency Services, and Mr. William Grimes, Vice President, Ancillary Services & Incident Commander, UM Charles Regional Medical Center provided an update on COVID-19 statistics and how they are responding to COVID-19.

Ms. Lilly indicated that COVID positive numbers and COVID deaths, remain steady. She also informed the Commissioners that the Department of Emergency Services will continue to provide logistical support for vaccine clinics and monitor COVID in the County. She also indicated her department was coordinating to deliver the vaccine through local churches.

Dr. Abney shared information on the vaccinations and the multiple vaccination clinics, mobile vaccines, Vaccine Equity Task Force Sites and other vaccine partners. She reported the statistics on

COVID vaccination doses given to Charles County residents and average age of COVID cases. She discussed Asymptomatic spread of COVID-19 and reminded of the importance of wearing your mask, watching your distance, and washing your hands. She reviewed current statistics on deaths, cases and hospitalizations by race on the three (3) COVID-19 variants and location of reported cases in the United States. She also discussed interim recommendations for fully vaccinated people.

Mr. Grimes indicated that the hospital admissions for COVID patients was down then went up slightly. He indicated that the vaccine clinic continues to vaccinate about one hundred and forty (140) people daily, five (5) days a week. He also discussed the mobile clinic being offered and providing pharmacy support to Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Ms. Jennifer Harris, Chief of Media Services, Office of the County Administrator, reviewed the County's communication efforts related to COVID 19. She discussed COVID-19 Vaccine Priority list, the latest Maryland GoVAX Commercial, featuring Dr. Abney, an upcoming commercial being made in Spanish, the Vaccine Rumor Control on social media, and frequently asked questions. She also spoke on the pause of the use of the Johnson and Johnson Vaccine due to some serious side effects.

Mr. Jason Stoddard, Director of Safety, Charles County Public Schools joined the discussion to update the Commissioners on vaccinations for Charles County Public School staff; the decrease in COVID positive cases and low numbers and no community spread; He also provided an update on social distancing in classrooms and in-person instruction and the tracking of student athletes.

Mr. Green explained the final wrap up review would be done in two (2) sessions. Today he reviewed the Charles County Legislative Agenda. Next week would be the Statewide wrap up review.

House Bill 1018/Senate Bill 833 Charles County – Alcoholic Beverages – Class 4 Limited Winery License

Passed.

Was withdrawn since conflicted with House Bill 670- Police Reform and Accountability Act of 2021, which passed with a veto override. The effective date is July 2022.

Passed with amendments.

House Bill 1061/Senate Bill 832 Southern Maryland – Multifamily Dwelling Registration – Fees and Fines

Passed with amendments.

House Bill 1072/Senate Bill 750 Charles County - Community Service and Pretrial Release Programs - Authorization

Passed with amendments.

House Bill 1081/Senate Bill 751 Southern Maryland – Human Relations Commission Was withdrawn.

House Bill 655 Local Government - County Commissioner Elections - District Voting Passed House; not acted on in Senate.

House Bill 414/Senate Bill 81 Southern Maryland Rapid Transit Project – Funding Passed with amendments.

Briefing: Charles County Charitable Trust Fiscal Year 2021 Annual Report

Ms. Vivian Mills, Executive Director, and Ms. Deborah Carrington, President, Charles County Charitable Trust, provided the annual update on the Charitable Trust for Fiscal Year 2020. Ms. Mills reviewed the progress report, grant award program, key data, return on investment, Coronavirus impact, additional emergency relief program, notable actins in Fiscal Year 2020 and plans for looking ahead. The Charitable Trust approved twenty-eight (28) grants and served thirty-eight thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight (38,898) people during this year.

Follow-Up Work Session: Bill 2021-01 Zoning Text Amendment #20-156, Agricultural Related Uses

Mr. Charles Rice, Assistant Chief of Planning, Department of Planning and Growth Management and Mr. Martin Proulx, Agricultural Business Development Manage, Department of Economic Development, reviewed the public comments and proposed amendment to Bill 2021-01 Zoning Text Amendment #20-156, Agricultural Related Uses from the Charles County Rural Planning and Zoning Task Force to strike the one hundred and fifty (150) foot set back requirement.

A motion was made by Commissioner Bowling, seconded by Commissioner Rucci and passed, with all Commissioners present, voting in favor to adopt Bill 2021-01 Zoning Text Amendment #20-156, Agricultural Related Uses with the recommended amendment from the Charles County Rural Planning and Zoning Task Force.

<u>Fiscal Year 2022 Budget Work Session: General Fund Revenue Outlook and Fiscal Year 2022-2026 Governmental Capital Improvement Project Review</u>

Ms. Jenifer Ellin, Director, Mr. Jacob Dyer, Chief of Budget, and Ms. TaTanya Bowman, Senior Budget Analyst, Department of Fiscal and Administrative Services, reviewed the Fiscal Year 2022-Fiscal Year 2026 Governmental Capital Improvement Program (CIP) with a total requested budget of five hundred three point one million dollars (\$503.1) and the Fiscal Year 2022 General Fund Revenues and Financing Sources of a total proposed budget of four hundred and forty nine million five hundred and twelve thousand eight hundred dollars (\$449, 512,800.00). Staff also reviewed the Governmental CIP Project Status Report. Ms. Ellin informed the Commissioners that they would receive an add/delete form for any of their proposed changes and requested that it be returned by April 28, 2021. She stressed that the current proposed budget is balanced so that if any projects are added, something needs to be deleted to cover the costs.

Commissioner Bowling requested that a briefing from staff on the Newburg Tier Map be added to the agenda.

There was a consensus to add this request to a future agenda.
