Mr. Fahad Hassan, Engineer, and Ms. Alicia Afroilan, Engineering Supervisor, Department of Planning and Growth Management, reviewed the proposed amendments and requested that the Commissioners schedule a public hearing.

A motion was made by Commissioner Rucci, seconded by Commissioner Bowling and passed, with all Commissioner present, voting in favor to schedule this public hearing for Wednesday September 21, 2022 at 6:00 p.m. in the Government Building Conference Room using a hybrid format, virtual and in person.

A roll call was taken. All Commissioners were present.

Briefing: Update on Charles County Disparity Study

Ms. Kelly Robertson-Slagle, Director, Ms. Lucretia Freeman-Buster, Chief of Business Development, Ms. Lucinia Mundy, Business Development Specialist, Department of Economic Development and Ms. Jenifer Ellin, Director, Department of Fiscal and Administrative Services, provided an update on the progress regarding the Charles County Disparity Study Implementation Plan. Highlights included a

brief review of disparity study results, contractor implementation plan recommendations, and progress made by staff to-date. County staff will work with consultant on development of legislative options for consideration by the Commissioners, including a possible option that allows priority for Charles County Headquartered Minority/Women-owned Business Enterprises (MWBE) businesses to qualify for Small Local Business Enterprise and MWBE Programs.

Commissioner Bowling stressed the importance to giving preference to Charles County businesses and not just the Southern Maryland area.

Briefing: Commission for Veterans Affairs Request Related to Bill 417 Property Tax - Credit for Disabled Veterans

Mr. Kabir Tompkins, Sr., Chairman, and Mr. Matthew Perez, Jr., Vice Chairman, Commission for Veterans Affairs; and Ms. Danielle Mitchell, Associate County Attorney II, Office of the County Attorney for Charles County, provided a presentation on Bill 417 Property Tax Credit for Disabled Veterans, which proposes a property tax credit against the county property tax imposed on the dwelling house of disabled veteran with a service-connected disability rating of at least fifty (50) percent.

Commissioner Bowling wanted to start this process and have staff begin to prepare local legislation. Commissioner Stewart wanted a break down of the other counties policies related to percentage for disabled categories prior to a fiscal impact briefing so that staff can provide parameters and options.

The Commissioners suggested that the Commission for Veterans Affairs seek outside funding options for a later meeting and consider surviving spouses within this request.

The Commissioners agreed that in addition to the fiscal impact that staff also include Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) impact on veterans in the County as well.

Commissioner Stewart queried about the Commission for Veteran's Affairs previous requests related to fundraising, a Memorial Garden, and hiring preference. Mr. Mark Belton, County Administrator indicated that an update would be given in September 2022.

Briefing: Town of La Plata Annexation Petition, "Hawthorne Yards"

Mr. Joel Binkley, Planner III, and Mr. Charles Rice, Assistant Chief, Department of Planning and Growth Management, provided an overview presentation on the Town of La Plata's Annexation Petition, "Hawthorne Yards." Staff findings are that this petition is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and is within the Town's Growth Area. Since the Town of La Plata is scheduled to hold a public hearing on this request on July 18, 2022 staff asked the Commissioners if they would like to provide any comments.

Commissioner Stewart expressed concerns for school seat allocations for students since the Town's policy indicates they can allocate one hundred (100) seats or more a year.

Mayor Jeanine James, Town of La Plata, informed the Commissioners that the Town Council was scheduled to meet on July 18, 2022 to discuss the school seat allocation as well.

Commissioner Collins requested that staff review establishing a Memorandum of Understanding with the Municipalities in the County.

The consensus of the Commissioners was to have staff prepare a similar letter of comment as the one sent for the Annexation, "The Hub," which requests that the record be kept open for thirty (30) days and to ensure that the project has adequate public facilities.

Follow Up Work Session: Amendments to the 2022-2031 Charles County Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan (CCCSWP)

Ms. Amy Blessinger, Planner III, Department of Planning and Growth Management; Ms. Margaret Romero, Recycling and Litter Control Superintendent, and Ms. Frances Sherman, Chief of Environmental Resources, reviewed the proposed language of the amendment. There were no additional comments following the public hearing.

A motion was made by Commissioner Stewart, seconded by Commissioner Coates and passed with all Commissioners present voting in favor to approve the amendment as presented.

A motion was made by Commissioner Rucci, seconded by Commissioner Bowling and passed, with all Commissioners voting in favor to approve Resolution 2022-11 Charles County Solid Waste Management Plan.

Closed Session

Briefing: Sustainable Community Designation for Waldorf Urban Redevelopment Corridor (WURC)

Ms. Amy Blessinger, Planner III, Mr. Jason Groth, Deputy Director, Department of Planning and Growth Management and Mr. Taylor Yewell, Redevelopment Manager, Department of Economic Development, joined the Commissioners to discuss the Sustainable Community Designation program. Ms. Blessinger reviewed the presentation on the Sustainable Community Designation for Waldorf. This designation was first designated in 2012 and needs to be renewed every five years. The designation allows Waldorf to be eligible for targeted state funding and assistance programs.

The Commissioners expressed interest in considering a park and keeping tree canopy as a part of the Waldorf Urban Redevelopment Corridor development. Staff indicated that the transition revision plans for the WURC project will be brought back to the Commissioners in the fall.

Work Session: Bill 2022-05 Community Service and Pretrial Release Program

Ms. Danielle Mitchell, Associate County Attorney, Office of the County Attorney, Charles County, provided the Commissioners an update on the proposed amendment which outlines disqualifying charges to this proposed Bill. She also reviewed a letter from the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) advising the Commissioners that they did not support adding this amendment to the Bill since disqualifying conditions for pretrial release are already well defined in the Annotated code of Maryland and in Maryland Rules; a validated pretrial risk assessment tool will be used; and the proposed language usurps judicial discretion.

A motion was made by Commissioner Bowling, seconded by Commissioner Rucci to adopt the Bill with the amendments.

Ms. Carol DeSoto, Clerk to the Board of County Commissioners, interjected that this motion needed to be rescinded and restated with correct action since the motion needed was to introduce the proposed amendments to the proposed Bill.

Commissioner Bowling rescinded his motion and Commissioner Rucci rescinded his second.

A motion was made by Commissioner Bowling, seconded by Commissioner Rucci and passed, with Commissioners Bowling, Rucci, and Stewart present, voting in favor to introduce the amendments as presented. Commissioners Coates and Collins were opposed. A roll call of the vote was taken: Commissioner Bowling-yes; Commissioner Coates-no; Commissioner Stewart-yes; Commissioner Rucci-yes; and Commissioner Collins-no. The motion passed three (3) to two(2).

Commissioner Stewart stressed the need for the public to weigh in on this Bill at the public hearing. The public hearing is scheduled for July 27, 2022. She also requested samples of the risk assessment tools.
