Legislative Update: 2024 Maryland General Assembly Session

Ms. Danielle Mitchell, Associate County Attorney, Office of the County Attorney; Ms. Jenifer Ellin, Acting Deputy County Administrator, Office of the County Administrator; Mr. Steve Proctor; Mr. Joseph Green; and Ms. Sherrie Simms, Lobbyists, GS Proctor and Associates, Inc., joined the Commissioners to provide an update on the 2024 Maryland General Assembly Session.

Ms. Mitchell explained that last evening (April 8, 2024) was Sine Die, which is the end of the 2024 Maryland General Assembly. She provided a brief update and informed the Commissioners that a more in-depth update/wrap up will be provided on April 16, 2024.

The Charles County Legislative Proposals

- HB440 *Motor Vehicle Registration Exceptions for Golf Carts and Low Speed Vehicles Cobb Island* Did not pass, but a statewide enabling legislation did pass.
- HB972 *Motor Vehicles Off–Highway Vehicles Clarifications and Revisions* Did not pass.
- HB690 *Charles County Adult Protective Services Review Board Membership* Passed, along with a statewide Bill that also passed.
- HB1321 A proposal to enact a Parkland Dedication Ordinance to require property developers pay a fee to be used instead of dedicating land (i.e., "fee-in-lieu"), or a combination of dedication or construction of recreational facilities.

Briefing and Request to Introduce and Set Public Hearing: Proposed Bill 2024-(09) Zoning Map Amendment (ZMA) 23-03 Martin Knapp Properties

Mr. Kirby Blass, Planner III, and Mr. Charles Rice, Planning Director, Department of Planning and Growth Management, explained that this proposed Bill would change the zoning designation of eight point one (8.1) combined acres from Central Business (CB) to High-Density Suburban Residential (RH). The Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval of ZMA #23-03 for adoption, based upon the rationale that there has been a substantial change in the character of the neighborhood; and in recognition of the properties designation within the Qualified Census Tracts (QCT) which incentivizes affordable housing.

The Water and Sewer Fund has a proposed budget of fifty-six million nine hundred and thirty-one thousand dollars (\$56,931,000.00) which is out of balance and would require a rate increase. The Recreation Fund has a proposed budget of two million one hundred and seventy-three thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,173,400.00) which is balance. The Cable Franchise Operations Fund has a proposed budget of three million four hundred and thirty-eight thousand and two hundred dollars (\$3,438,200.00) which is balanced, but the revenue in this fund is declining.

FY2025 Budget Work Session: Enterprise Funds, Operating and Capital Improvement 4
Program (CIP) Fees and Charges- Landfill, Stormwater, Environmental, Inspection Services

Mr. Jacob Dyer, Acting Director, and Ms. TaTanya Bowman, Assistant Chief of Budget, Department of Fiscal and Administrative Services, provided an overview summary of the Enterprise Funds, Operating and Capital Improvement 4 Program (CIP) Fees and Charges- Landfill, Stormwater, Environmental, Inspection Services. The Landfill Operations Fund has a proposed budget of fourteen million four hundred and twenty-five thousand eight hundred dollars (\$14,425,800.00) with a proposed fee increase. The Environmental Service Fund has a proposed budget of ten million twenty-one thousand one hundred dollars (\$10,021,100.00) with a proposed fee increase. The Watershed Protection and Restoration Fund has a proposed budget of eight million two hundred and forty-six thousand nine hundred dollars (\$8,246,900.00) which is out of balance and would require a fee increase. The Inspection and Review Fund has a proposed budget of ten million four hundred and thirty-eight thousand three hundred dollars (\$10,438,300.00) which is balanced. Mr. Dyer also provided a brief overview of the new fees.

Update: Goals and Objectives- Economic Development

Ms. Kelly Robertson-Slagle, Director, Ms. Michelle Frye, Deputy Director, and Ms. Jack Street, Research and Special Project Manager, Department of Economic Development, provided a presentation on Commissioner Goal 1—Economic Development and a preview of the new OpenGov dashboard, a platform designed to track data to enhance government transparency and efficiency.

Commissioner Bowling requested that members of the Business Cohort be invited for a future discussion.

Discussion: Solar and Renewable Energy Zoning Solar Farms

Commissioner Bowling; Mr. Jason Groth, Acting Director, Department of Planning and Growth Management; and Ms. Kelly Robertson-Slagle, Director, Department of Economic Development, discussed how staff was working behind the scenes with Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) related to solar legislation. Only SB783/HB1435 Renewable Energy – Net Energy Metering Aggregation, Solar Renewable Energy Credits, and Taxes on Solar Energy Generating Systems (Brighter Tomorrow Act) passed which is a bill which incentivizes solar. No land use or mandate legislation has been passed.

Commissioner's New Business

There was no new business discussed.

A roll call was taken. Commissioners Bowling, Stewart, Patterson, and Collins were present. *Commissioner Coates was absent.

Commissioners Bowling, Stewart, Patterson and Collins were in person.

Commissioners' Public Comment Session

Commissioners held an open session to receive public comments on any issue. This agenda item was added for the Commissioners to listen to feedback only, twice each month during their regular meetings.

There were nine (9) people who provided comments in person and two (2) people who provided virtual comments. Any written comments received were added to the website for the public to view.

Summary of Public Comments

In Person:

- Spoke on the building density within the Watershed Conservation District (WCD) and requested to consider changing the density from one (1) unit per twenty (20) acres to one (1) unit per ten (10) acres
- Noted that the County Attorney had concerns about the legality of the zoning related to the Bill 2023-13 ZTA 23-173 Independent Senior Living. Commissioners Bowling and Stewart requested delaying the vote for thirty (30) days to investigate further but the vote was against this delay. It was also mentioned that Commissioner Patterson does not speak up during the meetings and suggested the Commissioner Patterson and Coates may be lame ducks since his mother Delegate Patterson is nearing retirement and may be preparing a spot for him. Noted that the County needed Commissioners who pay attention and ask questions.
- Discussed complaint that was submitted to the Homeowners Association Dispute Review Board (HOADRB). In September of 2023, he submitted a complaint to the HOADRB with all documentation and required fee and since then he has not had a hearing due to a clerical error on the County, the board meeting every other month and a lack of preparation in review of cases. Additionally, a particular board member had not shown for over three meetings. He feels as though the HOADRB is ineffective in their review of complaints as well as their meeting to review cases. Also spoke on the new Docket 90 amendment with the Board of Education stating that they do not want an Elementary and Middle School side by side and that they agree with applicant moving the previously approved site for the Middle School to a total separate location even though in the original approved plan. And spoke about the need for residents to have an opportunity to comment on the Bill to remove a County Commissioner.
- Spoke on the 2016 Comprehensive Plan to set guidelines for the growth of the County. Now Commissioner Collins changed the County's vision for the lands near the airport to industrialize and develop over five hundred (500) acres, which goes against the 2016 Comp Plan. The speaker also highlights the changes made in the Bryans Road Area and how the Bryans Road Sub Area Plan cannot be implemented without first amending the Comp Plan. The plan is currently just words on a page, and using consistency with the Sub Area Plan for approving any amendment is meaningless. The speaker is pointing out the misrepresentation of the Sub Area Plan in the new Airport zone amendments. They believe that the current vision for Bryans Road is what is written in the 2016 Comprehensive Plan and are requesting the reference to the "updated vision" be removed from the preamble of both bills to ensure accuracy.
- Expressed frustration with the planning process and how his hours of preparation for public hearings and letters seem to be boiled down to a single number in an up or down vote. He questions whether his comments are being heard and considered by the Commissioners particularly regarding the Masters Child site and the issue of spot zoning. He also raises

- concerns about a Commissioner's potential conflict of interest. Overall, he hopes that his research and data will inform the Commissioner's choices that the planning process will be more open minded and transparent.
- Stated that the Charles County Code of Ethics that emphasizes on maintaining impartiality and independent judgment of public officials and employees. It prohibits officials from participating in any decision-making process in which they or their qualified relatives have an interest. The speaker notes that Commissioner Coates must not participate in the BOCC's public hearings, discussion, and vote for ZMA 23-02 as one of the properties subject to the ZMA is owned by a qualified relative of Commissioner Coates.
- Concerns that no citizen can look at our budget and see what we are spending on Economic Development. That needs to change. Our county needs well-paying job growth and increases commercial tax base. But we can't even tell what we're spending on Economic Development. The reason is that the Economic Development budget number is inflated, because the Economic Development budget includes what we are spending on some purchasing activity. Purchasing is the work for the county to buy stuff. That is an administrative and compliance function. Feels the County needs focused, prudent, data-driven, business-oriented strategies and tactics to advance job growth and the commercial tax base. Put purchasing expenses and activities back in purchasing; Have our Economic Development budget reflect what we are spending on Economic Development and make sure the Director has what is needed to help advance job growth and commercial tax base; and pass legislation to remove a Commissioner for ethics violations, because that will be coming back to you in this Spring's legislative proposals.
- Expressed gratitude towards the County staff for their hard work and dedication. Also request the County Commissioners make it mandatory for a member to be physically present in the room during meetings unless there are extenuating circumstances. The speaker also emphasizes the importance of Commissioner Coates to be present in their own district and fulfill her responsibilities towards all citizens of Charles County.
- The need for Commissioner Coates to recuse herself from voting on Bill related to the Aviation Business Park Stated that the expansion should not include the east side of the airport which has steep stream valleys and that the Mattawoman would be destroyed by the seventy percent (70%) impervious surface allowed in the expansion

Summary of Public Comments

Virtual:

Provided an update on the charter document. Mentioned what is not included in the charter such
as a Police Department, career fire, and the appointment of a School Superintendent. He also
talked about what the charter includes, such as term limits for both the proposed executive and
the council, district voting code and town hall requirements. The charter document is residentdriven and elected officials cannot change it. All Charles County residents will vote on the
charter in November.

• Expressed gratitude towards the public officials for their service and encourages them to continue with public comments. Highlighted the need for ambulances, police officers and firefighters in Charles County. Additionally, mentioned the issues with charter government and urged the officials to address the problems faced by citizens, and mentioned a concerns about the recent increase in excise taxes.
